Background

Bedford Hills Township Bark Park has become a popular recreational spot for dog owners to allow their pets to socialize and exercise off-leash. Incident Overview

Unsafe Entry and Exit Practices

Public Safety Concerns

Negative Community Impact

Recommendation

Given the data highlighting the frequent incidents and the lack of knowledge among dog owners, it is recommended that a dog owner safety course be developed to address these issues. The course should cover proper entry and exit procedures, adherence to size guidelines, and education on canine behavior to reduce the occurrence of preventable incidents. This targeted training will contribute to a safer and more enjoyable environment at Bedford Hills Township Bark Park for both dogs and their owners.
